Biographical:

Paul Smith (1904-1977) was a publisher, writer, and bookshop owner; he opened the Provincetown Bookshop in 1932.

Summary:

An aspiring writer, the collection chiefly consists of letters he received from editors and publishers responding to his submissions. While some responders are terse, Marianne Moore (1887-1972, The Dial) is gentle and encouraging, her words full of sensitive insight. Harold Vinal (1891-1965, Voices) appears to have become a helpful mentor to Smith. Other letters are from William Russell Clark, James Southall Wilson (1880-1963, Virginia Quarterly Review), John Angus Burrell (1890-1957, Columbia University), Dorothea Brande (1893-1948, The Bookman), and Mark Van Doren (1894-1972, Columbia).
